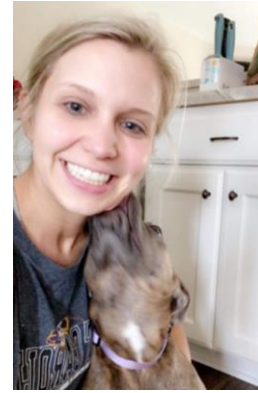
These are hard times for everyone, but as always our amazing and supportive community is helping us through it. We don't have an end date for everything that's happening, but we will continue to adapt and save lives.

## Kitten Season Begins

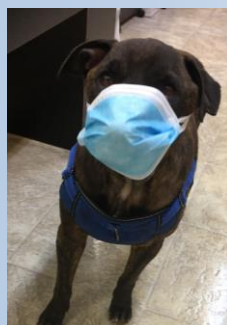
If there is one thing COVID-19 is not affecting, it's kitten season. Spring is here and litters of kittens are appearing as quickly as the daisies. If you find a litter of kittens, be sure to follow these steps:

- Determine if the kittens are visibly sick or injured. → If they are, immediately call your animal control agency.
- If they appear healthy, monitor from a distance to see if a mom returns to them. → If mom does not return within a few hours, call animal control.
- Do not pick up kittens if you are not able to provide long-term care.



## Pet Health & Wellness Tip

We all hope that the precautions we are taking will protect us, but the reality is that many people will still fall ill. If that happens to you, what will happen to your pets? Now is the time to make a plan. The same as preparing for a natural disaster, your plan for COVID-19 needs to include your furry family members! Your plan should cover:

- Contact information and instruction for the person
- All supplies that person may need in your absence, including medications
